Board of Directors Meeting Minutes 26 February 2020 **Hyatt Regency Hotel** Crystal City, Arlington, VA

Call to Order Chairman LtGen Norman Smith called the IJAA 26 Feb 2020 Board of Directors Meeting to order at 1800.

Opening Remarks LtGen Smith welcomed all and thanked Shayne Jarosz, Art Sifuentes, and the entire Gala team for their efforts planning the 75th Anniversary of the Battle for Iwo Jima Commemorative Symposium and up-coming Iwo Jima trip. He remarked we would move through the agenda briskly in order to make dinner by 2000.

Roll Call Executive Director Art Sifuentes called the roll. In attendance were LtGen Norman Smith, MajGen David Bice, Bill Davis, Gene Colabatistto, David Fields, Linda Griffin, Ivan Hammond, Shavne Jarosz, Kevin Jarvis, Laura Leppert, Bill Rockey, David Scott, Art Sifuentes, and Bill Smith. A quorum was deemed present.

General Smith announced that Col Wiedhahn's wife, Jane had undergone surgery, and all were praying for her. There was no recent news other than the surgery went well.

General Smith thanked Gene Colabatistto, Development Committee Chair, for his efforts in developing the financial plan for the Symposium's Gala.

General Smith prevailed on board members to assist as much as possible with any popup issues with our veterans and guests particularly during the Gala, e.g. locating their banquet tables.

Approval of 30 October 2019 Board Meeting Minutes General Smith requested a motion be made to approve the 30 October 2019 Board of Director's Meeting Minutes. A motion was made to approve, seconded, and voted with no dissensions.

MajGen Bice reported a two-year renewal consulting contract had been signed between Art Sifuentes, IJAA and MHT.

All IJAA arrears payments to MHT will be resolved in the coming weeks.

Treasurer's Report David Scott, Treasurer reported his team of Wes Elder and Art Sifuentes had completed a detailed 2019 Profit and Loss Statement delineating Budget vs Actual. Copies were provided at the Board meeting. Additionally, an IRS Form 990 has been prepared and is ready for submission. IRS Form 990 is available upon request.

David Fields remarked he had a number of questions on the expense and budget entries, membership income vs expenditures, ads, etc. Given the limited time allocated for this Board meeting, General Smith directed any attendant questions be addressed by interested individuals in a side bar.

Development Committee Gene Colabatistto reported pledges received for the Gala totaled \$207K. It was anticipated that 93-94% percent of the pledges will be paid. To date all but \$40K has been collected.

The Silent Auction will be displayed in the banguet reception area. Non-Gala donations total \$43K. Projections include Gala, Symposium, and Reunion of Honor. It is expected, after expenses, to clear approximately \$122K. The majority of collections came from those donating at the \$5K level.



The Silent Auction will be displayed in the banquet reception area.

On 23 February, the Washington Capitals hockey game honored CWO Hershel "Woody" Williams, USMC (Ret), last surviving WWII Pacific Theater Medal of Honor awardee. In attendance were 20,000 fans joined by 4 million viewers watching on TV.

US House and Senate Resolutions commemorating the 75th Anniversary of the Battle for Iwo Jima were signed on Capitol Hill 13 February. Congressman Ken Calvert submitted the House Resolution. Copies of the Resolutions were separately sent to all Board members as well as made available at the meeting.

Kudos were expressed to Fred Lash for his media outreach regarding the commemorative events, particularly for getting the 75th Commemoration on the front page of the Washington Post.

Membership Report Art Sifuentes reported The IJAA member roster lists 2391 individual members. It appears that we have a large number of non-renewals, who join for the Iwo Jima tour, as required, but do not renew. Automatic notifications via email are sent out annually. An effort will soon be underway to cull out those who have not renewed over the last two years in order to purify the roster.

Current membership of Iwo Jima Veterans numbers 339.

Fundraising Noreen O'Leary is taking on IJAA's fundraising effort for the IJAA Marine Corps Marathons. She is asking all Half Marathon runners to raise a minimum \$300 each for their May run and participation in the October Marathon

All Board members were asked to spread the word and get Marathon participants, sponsors and donors.

The West Coast IJAA is folding its tent. Shayne Jarosz said IJAA purchased an ad in the West Coast 75th Anniversary Journal to generate additional IJAA members.

Symposium Several buses, departing at 1300, are being provided from the hotel to the Marine Corps Monument for attendance at the Commandant's 1400 Commemoration Event. The Hospitality Room must be vacated by midnight. The maximum number of attendees for the Gala will be 550. Everyone will be seated in the main ballroom.

American Airlines is providing free roundtrip airfare for all participating Iwo Jima Veterans and a travel companion.

Governance Committee Bonnie Haynes requested to step down as head of the Governance Committee, but will remain on the Board. Dave Fields has agreed to chair the Governance Committee and update the IJAA By-Laws. Bill Smith will be an advisor to the Governance Committee.

Virginia State Law requires a non-profit corporation to have a Secretary. Linda Griffin has volunteered to fill that position. A motion was made, seconded, and passed for Linda Griffin to become Secretary.

MajGen Ewers has agreed to be IJAA's General Consul. His final USMC assignment was as the SJA to the Commandant. A motion was made, seconded, and approved for General Ewers to be the IJAA General Counsel.

Media Report Fred Lash and Will Donaldson monitor the website. Will Donaldson created the Wall of Honor on our website, which has raised \$2K-3K to date.

A 75th Commemorative Book will be published later this year following the Reunion of Honor. Heather Briley-Schmidt is taking photographs and will edit the book. Other 75th Commemorative events under consideration are an UAA Day at a Washington Nationals home game as well as a 75th Commemorative Golf Tournament

2020 Reunion of Honor The Chairman JCS, CNO, the Commandant, LtGen Smith, and MajGen Bice will attend and are slated to speak. Twelve Congressmen and Senators will be flying in on a Congressional flight. Sixteen Iwo Jima Veterans will be participating. IJAA is coordinating with III MEF regarding the Coronavirus impact. (NOTE: The Reunion of Honor was postponed to Fall 2020; date to be determined).

Ms Laura Leppert brought a picture of Iwo Jima signed by two MOH recipients. She requested the money raised from its sale go to Daughters of WW II. No discussion ensued.

As there was no further business, a motion was made, seconded and passed to adjourn. Meeting ended at 1857.


* The evening continued with the wonderful music and entertainment from Rick and Robin's Radio King Orchestra.

Don't grieve for me for now I'm free. I'm following the path God has laid you see. I took His hand when I heard him call. I turned my back and left it all.


I could not stay another day, to laugh, to love, to play. Tasks left undone must stay that way. I found that peace at the close of day.

Remembrance



My birthday is May 14, 1925. On Iwo Jima I was a PFC Elwood Hughes serial

number 868861, a member of the 5th Amphibious Corps, Signal Battalion serving in the Headquarters Company of the 5th. Marine Division, Keller E. Rockey Commander. I went ashore February 22, 1945 and left the island March 16, 1945. During that period I was exposed to the sights, sounds and smell of battle. This was not new to me because I had participated in the battle of Saipan. However, my memory of the sights, sounds and smell of Iwo Jima have been more lasting and intense. Upon landing on Iwo Jima I was directed to the edge of Motoyama Airfield #1 where the 5th. Marine Division Command Center was being located and ordered to dig a fox hole nearby and stand by for duty. Within 24 hours I was witness to the most historic event of the history of the Marine Corps.

The first memory and lasting memory I have of the island is the smell of Sulphur. However, if you could find a hot spot that the Sulphur created, you could heat your C-Ration and coffee. The sound of battle was intense. When I first arrived at the command center, the front lines were only a few hundred yards away and I could see and feel the action of our artillery non-stop. I could also hear the rat-a-tat-tat of machine gun fire. Another memory I have is the piercing sound of a siren to let the command center know it was about to be a hit with mortar and artillery fire and to take cover. Occasionally, after the all clear, I could hear the call of "Corpsman" signifying that someone had bee hit. Some of my major duties was to be on call to run messages and also assigned to tasks with the center to maintain its effectiveness.

Mights on Iwo will always be remembered by star shells drifting over the island lighting up the area revealing ghost like pictures of men and terrain. Other sights of my time on lwo are both most memorable and disturbing. As I was away from the command center, some distance at times, I witnessed the dead scattered over the battle field. Seeing the enemy dead affected me emotionally but more was seeing fellow Marines.

Because of my longevity, a personal event was recognized recently by the gathering of our countries Indian Nations and contact with the Navaio Code Talkers on Iwo Jima.

As the purpose of the invasion was to aid the Army Air Corps, I was witness to the first B-29, Dina Mite, make an emergency landing and the first squadron of P31 Mustang fighters to land over my fox hole located close to Motoyama Airfield #1. My impression at the time of the Dina Mite was its size and of the Mustangs the speed of which they displayed.

Duty in the command center gave me information of the progress of the battle and contact with some of the officers. I remember the language officer by the name of Lt. John T. McLean who spoke fluent Japanese. I observed him once interrogating one of the few prisoners. I admired him for going into numerous caves trying to persuade the enemy to surrender. He almost lost his life in the cave that killed Bill Genaust the Marines combat photographer.

The ship is named after retired Marine Corps Chief Warrant Officer Four Hershel Woodrow Williams. At 95 years old, Williams is the last surviving Medal of Honor recipient recognized for his heroic deeds at the Battle of Iwo Jima during World War II.


I'm grateful to all those who have the expertise to put something like this together," said Hershel Woodrow Williams, retired CWO4. The commissioning of the ship as a United States Ship will make it a more versatile and flexible warfighting machine, capable of a variety of sea missions. The ship operates with a mixed crew of Navy Seamen, Mariners, and civilians and is uniquely designed, being only the second ship of its kind, to have an open operations deck below and a flight deck above.

Its capabilities as a warfighting asset are not to be outdone, however, by its overall cost effectiveness as stated by General David H. Berger.

Quote: Hershel (Woody) Woods Williams

"Many of the miracles in my life have occurred because of the actions of others." Hershel "Woody" Williams, a 5-foot-6-inch kid who had only gotten into the Marines after they lowered the height standard, eliminated seven machine gun nests with a flame thrower and explosive charges in the battle of Iwo Jima in 1945. His grisly work, for which Williams sought no glory, took four hours. It helped the U.S. win a pivotal battle in the Pacific Theater and earned Williams, the Medal of Honor

The nation's top military officer, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, General Mark Milley, U.S. Army, paid tribute on February 19th to the thousands of U.S. Marines and Navy Corpsmen who took part in what he called "the bloodiest campaign in American history, per square mile," the World War II battle for Iwo Jima.

During the Pacific battle, which began on February 19, 1945 and lasted through March, nearly 7000 U.S. service members died and more than 19,000 were wounded. Among those landing on the island was Alexander Milley, father of General Milley.

"My father and those fellow Marines and Navy corpsmen who were hitting the beach were told there were no Japanese left alive," gen. Milley recounted during the ceremony. "They hit the beach and got in about 800 meters or so, and then they hit a trigger line. Then all hell broke loose."

"They began slugging it out, inch by inch, yard by yard for the next 36 days."

He called the Iwo Jima campaign "an unbelievable battle in an entire war of unbelievable battles"

Milley said the goal of everyone who wears a uniform is to "never again" allow a great power war like the two world wars, in which 150 million peope perished between 1914 and 1945. Let us resolve that we're not going to ever have another great power war, because the slaughter it involves, is beyond the imagination, beyond the pale," he said.

The Expeditionary Sea Base Hershel "Woody" Williams was commissioned as a warship on March 7, 2020. The ship transfers from military Sealift Command to the Navy. In attendance to the event were figures such as the Commandant of the Marine Corps, West Virginia Senator Joe Manchin, Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff General Mark A. Milley; James Geurts, Assistant Secretary of the Navy; and five Medal of Honor recipients.

ARTHUR W. RODRIGUEZ Remembrance

This story is the way I remember it happening back in February 1945.

During the battle of Iwo Jima I was a Browning Automatic Rifleman, a B.A.R. man, of the rank of PFC. I was in the First Platoon of Rifle Company C (called Charlie Company), part of the First Battalion, 23rd Regiment, Fourth Marine Division. Each squad was led by a sergeant and consisted of three groups, each group had a group leader, a KBAR man and BAR assistant and a rifleman. My group was led by Corporal Lloyd Prevatte; in the other two groups were Corporal Morris Fusco and BAR man Richard Grider; and Corporal Ed Rajkowski and BAR man Ward. (After so many years, I'm afraid I don't remember any of the other names.)

It has taken me many years to accept that I, as a veteran from the Fourth Marine Division, can add to our part of the overall picture of this historic battle and not leave it all to the historians.

I now believe that anyone that took part in this battle should tell their story in writing. This way we can better understand the pain, suffering, and death; also why we had so many causalities.

JOINT REUNION OF HONOR TO IWO JIMA **POSTPONED TO FALL 2020**

As we were preparing for the trip to Guam and the Joint Reunion of Honor on Iwo Jima, the COVID-19 coronavirus, which originated in Asia, began to spread across the globe. Accordingly, the Join Reunion of Honor planned for March 28, 2020 on Iwo Jima was postponed. IJAA and Military Historical Tours issued the following:

Due to the concerns of the spreading of COVID-19 coronavirus, Japanese officials have decided to postpone the Joint Reunion of Honor (ROH) on Iwo Jima (IwoTo), planned for March 28, 2020 to a later date this year. The IJAA will continue to coordinate with the US and Japanese officials on the new date for the ROH, and are looking at a new window in the October/November time-frame. IJAA will advise all when a date has been set. We anticipate a date being set soon. The priority remains the health and safety of the attendees, particularly the Iwo Jima veterans.
